BADLANDS (15) - 50th Anniversary - Members' Choice 11th September

Director: Terence Malik | USA | 1973 | 94 minutes



Rated as the fourth best crime film of all time, Badlands is a truly iconic original: eloquent about the intersection of crime, romanticism and myth making in America, highly innovative in its use of colour, cinematography, editing and voice-over, with an inspired musical soundtrack. This confident, stunning, unforgettable directorial debut also established the careers of lead characters Martin Sheen and Sissy Spacek. P.S.

COMPARTMENT NUMBER SIX (15)

25th September

Director: Juho Kuosmanen | Finland | 2021 | 107 Minutes | Subtitled



"An Arctic road movie that takes place in a train". Shot largely within the confines of a real Russian train, the film brilliantly captures the authentic air of its setting, inhabited by two wildly mismatched travellers. Confident directing and excellent performances ensure the film's central theme of overcoming otherness and finding common ground across personal, cultural and geographical borders inspires hope for troubled times. NEVER LOOK AWAY (15)

9th October

Director: Florian Henckel von Donnersmarck | Germany | 2018 | 189 Minutes | Subtitled



When two German art students fall in love, the girl's father vows to end their relationship, but their lives are already intertwined by a devastating secret. An epic intergenerational tale of art, love, tragedy and politics. Provocative storytelling from the writer/director of the "The Lives of Others" and superb cinematography along with a lustrous, hypnotic score, underpin a stunning masterpiece, one of the best films I have seen. YOU WILL DIE AT TWENTY (12)

23rd October

Director : Amjad Abu Alala | Sudan | 2019 | 103 Minutes |Subtitled



Is it superstition or blind faith that condemns this child to be raised from birth, believing he will die at 20? Taunted by the other boys as "the son of death", Muzamil eventually finds his place memorizing the Quran and working for the village shopkeeper. Though imperfect, being both guileless and cynical, this first feature is visually stunning and beautifully composed. J.D.

BOILING POINT

6th November

Director: Philip Barantini | UK | 2021 | 92 Minutes



This is a one-shot film, starring the ever-brilliant Stephen Graham. I am lost in admiration for how they managed to achieve this in only 4 takes before the covid lockdown ended the shoot. THE MAN WHO SOLD HIS SKIN (15)

20th November

Director: Kaouther Ben Hania | Tunisia | 2020 | 15 | 104 Minutes | Subtitled



Nominated best international feature at the 2021 Oscars, this Tunisian film tells a story of two lovers separated by the Syrian civil war. The refugee flees to Lebanon where he allows his back to become a canvas for a famous artist. The film is original, captivating, has many twists, is engaging throughout and thought-provoking with poignant messages about borders, freedom, art and the state of humanity. It's a 'must-see'. BLIND AMBITION (12A)

11th December

Directors: Robert Coe & Warwick Ross | Australia | 2021 | 96 Minutes | Subtitled



Here is an inspiring, true-life documentary for you to savour.

Follow four young, Zimbabwean refugees on their uplifting journey to become World Class Sommeliers, representing their country in the 'Olympics of Wine Tasting' at Chateau de Gilly, France. "When Life Closed a Door, they opened a bottle." Heart-warming, with subtle notes of humour. A very fine vintage! D.I.

WINNERS (PG)

15th January

Director: Hassan Nazer | UK/Iran | 2022 | 85 Minutes | Subtitled



A heartwarming Persian language film with the magic of cinema at its heart. The story features two young children who rush out from school every day with their classmates to sort through rubbish at the local tip, in order to try to make some money for their poverty-stricken families. One day they come across a statue. The boss of the tip, who shares his love of film with them, realises the significance of this statue and decides that they must reunite the statue with its owner. DECISION TO LEAVE (15)

29th January

Director: Park Chan-Wook | South Korea | 2022 | 139 Minutes | Subtitled



A married insomniac detective, investigating the unexplained death of a man in the mountains, becomes obsessed with his widow in this stylish, twisty, mystery romance. Pak Chan-Wook described it as 'a love story that does not say the words, "I Love You." Beautifully filmed on location in South Korea, it received critical acclaim across the world. M.H.

LES MISÉRABLES (15)

12th February

Director: Ladj Ly | France | 2019 | 104 Minutes | Subtitled



Inspired by the Victor Hugo quote "There are no weeds, and no worthless men. There are only bad farmers". First time director Ladj Ly's Les Misérables is an explosive crime drama where already simmering tensions between police, local Muslim leaders and youths in a Paris suburb boil over after a young lad steals a lion cub from a visiting circus. UTAMA (12A)

26th February

Director: Alejandro Loayza Grisi | Bolivia | 2022 | 127 Minutes | Subtitled



A visually stunning film set in the harsh but beautiful highlands of Bolivia. An elderly couple, Virginio and Sisa, have lived out their married life in the traditional way in this vast, challenging landscape. Things come to a head with the visit of a grandson from the city, who is shocked by their way of life in the face of drought and increasing infirmity. The film mirrors the universal dilemma of an elderly couple reluctant to accept the need for change to an easier lifestyle. J.G.

ROCKS (12A)

11th March

Director: Sarah Gavron | UK | 2019 | 93 Minutes



When 15-year-old Shola 'Rocks' Omotoso is suddenly abandoned by her depression-prone mum, she is forced to fend for herself and younger brother, Emmanuel, in their London council flat. Fearing they will be taken into care and forced apart, she resorts to desperate measures to evade the authorities. Prepare yourself for an uplifting, contemporary tale of Girl Power. D.I.

THE QUIET GIRL (12A)

25th March - Double bill

Director: Colm Bairead | Ireland | 2022 | 95 Minutes | Subtitled



Beautifully restrained, yet emotionally resonant...a lovely, touching film that says more through hushed understatement than most do using frenzied melodramatic excess. With understated performances and an eye for natural beauty, the film is a poignant exploration of love and loss. It is a cinematic gem, using realism, sensitive direction and a luminous central performance, to create a profoundly moving and immersive film. P.S. Directors: Tom Berkely, Ross White | Northern Ireland 2022 | 23 Minutes



Charming, funny, moving and stunningly shot, this film explores themes of tradition, loss and family, whilst also addressing the issue of caring for someone with special needs. Exploring the relationship between two brothers, following the death of their mother, it is a masterclass in storytelling, casting, and cinematography. 8th April

Directors: Mariano Cohn, Gastón Duprat | Spain | 2018 | 189 Minutes | Subtitled



A wealthy businessman hires a neurotic director to produce his crowning achievement - a brilliant art film. Spectacular acting performances by the three stars: Penelope Cruz (the 'director'), Antonio Banderas and Oscar Martinez (the competing 'actors') result in a wildly entertaining film. FLEE (15)

22nd April

Director: Jonas Poher Rasmussen | Denmark/Sweden | 2021 | 89 Minutes | Subtitled



Flee tells the true story of, Amin's incredible journey, as a child refugee, from Afghanistan to Denmark. Travelling over land and sea Amin comes across the best and worst of humanity. Amin's compelling story is beautifully and skilfully told using animation and archive footage. Flee broke records in 2022 gaining Oscar nominations for Best International Film, Best Animation and Best Documentary. M.H.
